# CAFOD

It is sixty years since the Bishops' Conference of England and Wales registered CAFOD as an official charity. This was two years after a group of Catholic women responded to an appeal from the Caribbean Island of Domenica where children were starving. On Friday March 11<sup>th</sup> 1960, families were asked to spend as little as possible on food, eat only one main meal and donate the money saved. The Catholic community responded magnificently and raised the equivalent of nearly £150,000 today. This amazing



generosity was quickly recognised by the Hierarchy and CAFOD was born. During these sixty years CAFOD has worked in over forty countries supporting, educating and training numerous communities to fight against food and health inequality



term. In Sierra Leone, as we learned during the Lenten Appeal, when malnutrition endangered Lombeh's life as a baby, the Sisters were there to help with healthcare and nutrition classes. Amie, Lombeh's Mum, says: 'When she started growing, I was so happy!'

Little did we know that it would also provide a Mass Centre each Sunday and also a teaching post for Janice for many years

In time, St Peter's and then Catholic Learnington gave us so much more: the marriage of our daughter, Helen, and then the ordination of our son, Nick; St Peter's Aid for the Needy (SPAN); CAFOD; Justice and Peace; LiveSimply; and above all Christian Life Community (CLC) which has been the mainstay and bedrock of our Faith and Christian life

Finally, and very recently, we have experienced the Synod in our parish, which highlights the thinking faith of the people here. When one reads the report that has been produced, it is difficult to think of another parish that would be capable of doing anything like that. Being part of that process was most uplifting and encouraging. If we had been staying, we would have wanted to see that continued in the future, and hopefully it will be

## Synod on Synodality

We are now a third of the way through the synod timescale; our Catholic Leamington synod report is available on the webpage www.catholicleamington.org.uk/synod I hope you felt your views were reflected in the report. The Diocesan Synthesis – the Diocesan response to all parish reports, sent to the English and Welsh Catholic Bishops' Conference, is also available on this page

A letter writer in *The Tablet* Catholic Weekly (22<sup>nd</sup> April) criticises the Diocesan response, saying that although it quotes many comments, it gives no sense of whether any are widely held views, thus avoiding recognising where the discernment of most parishes was pointing

In the second paragraph of the synthesis, I was encouraged by the statement about the Church's commitment to dialogue with other Christians – her openness to listen and learn; I feel I have been waiting since Vatican II to see practical evidence of this

I welcome the recognition that as the people of God, laity and clergy are co-responsible for our Church

The three Pillars of the synod (Communion, Participation and Mission) are framed to help us recognise that our love of Jesus leads us to communal worship, to share the Eucharist, learn more about Him particularly through His Word which then emboldens us to community action for the poor and to share our faith with others (mission)

The synthesis mentions in its final paragraphs that many want to see Church teaching shift, yet in the same section it says many others want to see it better explained. Personally, I believe a shift is essential, alongside formation, to enable us all to feel comfortable about explaining our faith with conviction, accepting that people can hold differing views. The disciples had the Eucharist as food for their journey and were not required to have any developed doctrinal formulation in order to partake – why should we behave differently
