World Day of the Sick

World Day of the Sick takes place on 11 February, 2026. Every year, on the feast of Our Lady of Lourdes, the whole church celebrates together and prays for those who are ill.

This is also an appropriate time to think about the ways we can best support people who are ill, and make them our VIPs just as much as the pilgrims who are helped to travel to Lourdes.

In each of our parishes some **Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist** enable the sick and housebound to receive Holy Communion regularly. Arrangements differ in each parish but volunteers who can commit to this should talk to their Parish Priest or a Deacon to find out what is involved. Often this, and other visiting and support, overlaps with our excellent conferences of the St Vincent de Paul society. *Fr David Hartley*

The Rite of Reception

We pray for all those in our parishes preparing to be received into Full Communion or be Baptised this Easter. The Rite of Reception is an opportunity for them to meet many others, including our bishops, and realise just how many people are praying for them.

Archbishop Bernard writes: *"I look forward to welcoming those who are preparing for Baptism, Confirmation or Full Communion into the Catholic Church at the Rite of Election at 3.00 pm at St Chad's Cathedral on the First Sunday of Lent, 22 February."* His Grace goes on to thank the clergy *"and your parish catechists for accompanying these men and women on their journey of faith."*

Hollie and David, two St Joseph's parishioners received into the Faith last Easter, share their experience:

Walking into the Cathedral for the Rite of Election was a truly surreal moment for us last year. People from all different backgrounds were gathered there for the same purpose, each of us taking one of the first steps toward accepting the truth of Jesus Christ, and the Church He established into our hearts and lives. As we looked around the beautiful Cathedral and saw the diversity and eclectic mix of people, it became a powerful sign to us that Christianity truly is the one true faith and path to God; a faith that transcends race, culture, individual life experiences and circumstances. All equal, we were brought together as united, beloved children in the eyes of our Creator.


World Day of Prayer

World Day of Prayer on **Friday 6 March** is themed “Rest for the Weary”, prepared by women from Nigeria. Formerly known as Women’s World Day of Prayer, this ecumenical movement arranges services from across the globe - each year’s service being written and prepared by the women of a different country. This is important particularly in countries where women lack equality with men and may have very little autonomy. The service itself, however, welcomes everyone. Its theme – “Rest for the Weary” – encourages prayer for peace and solace across the world.

Nigeria is a country in West Africa and is the most populous in the whole of Africa with a population of over 200 million. It is rich in natural resources such as oil and minerals, but has been affected by climate change. This has reduced farming land through rising temperatures and lack of rain and threatens coastal communities by rising sea levels. It faces difficulties such as an unequal distribution of wealth and gender discrimination in education and pay. There is a disproportionately high mother and baby mortality rate. The terrorist activities of the militant group Boko Haram are frequently spread across the world’s media.

The World Day of Prayer is a powerful demonstration of global solidarity. It begins in Samoa and moves across over 120 countries of the world finishing 38 hours later in American Samoa, making it truly a worldwide day of prayer. In Catholic Leamington, there is a 2.00 pm service at St Joseph’s Church, Whitnash.

Hospital Chaplaincy

In the hospitals different arrangements are made. I provide six hours each week of visiting (on three separate days) to establish contact with every Catholic inpatient we can find. With my nurse training in the past, I find hospital a familiar environment. Often, the people we visit have been away from their practice of the faith but somehow get referred to us. When you hear of anyone being admitted, please feel free to refer them to me.

In addition to my visits I am also on call, assisted by other local clergy, so that **we can be called in emergencies by the hospital switchboard at any time**. I would like to thank Fr Arul Samy, Fr Kevin Hooper, and Fr Damian Nwanko, all of whom gave very committed service in Leamington and Warwick hospitals when they were in the area. At present Fr Stephen and Fr Patrick are supporting me, and we very much hope that Fr Ryan can begin soon. Thank you from us all to those involved in this.

On the days I can't be in Warwick hospital, visiting is supported by Frances, Nick, and Deacon David Palmer. They volunteer for a few hours and often find new contacts, and also minister Holy Communion to those we know are ready

and able to receive. Those who volunteer undertake training along with other chaplaincy volunteers from other Christian traditions and other faiths. If you might be able to get involved please contact me.

On the first Thursday of each month I celebrate Mass at 1.00 pm in the Warwick Hospital chapel and all are welcome.





The People of God on a journey, together, led by the Spirit.

This is Synodality – it should be a familiar word.

Synodality should not be reduced to a series of techniques for managing meetings, but it is a spiritual and ecclesial experience that involves growing in a renewed way of being Church with a view to more confidently / effectively carrying out our mission of evangelisation.

We recognise that the People of God have diverse views but are all equal in the eyes of God. The views of everyone should be listened to with openness, as all are co-responsible and nobody should shelve that responsibility. Hopefully we will ask “What can I do?”

Pope Francis called us all to listen to each other in our parishes, asking us what we loved or thought about our faith. This was the **Consultation Phase** of the Synod, started in October 2021 giving hope to many for a renewed and regenerated Church. The **Discernment Phase** followed with two gatherings (Synods) in Rome over two years. A *Final Document* was published in October 2024 and became part of the Church’s authoritative teaching. See www.catholicleamington.org.uk/synod for links to various documents.

Pope Leo emphasises synodality—walking together, listening, and discerning—as the proper reception and implementation of Vatican II, seeing it as a way to bridge divides (including ecumenical ones) through shared participation, while addressing concerns about authority by stressing that true synodality fosters mission and collaboration rather than diminishing leadership.

Where are we now? Did you know that this year, 2026, we are in the **Implementation Phase of a Synodal Church** for all Catholic Parishes in the world, with a review expected to start from January 2027! Parishes will be asked about their progress on Synodality during future Diocesan visitations. For some parishes this will be quite a challenge in just one year, but also doable!

What is being called for in this year and how is Catholic Leamington progressing?

Fundamentally we are being asked to listen better to each other and have spiritual conversations where at all practical. Ordained and Laity should collaborate together with transparency and openness.

Much of this is already happening across our churches - but we need more practice in incorporating spiritual exercises into our plans. A bigger challenge is engaging all parishioners, particularly those on the fringes for whatever reason.

There are practical examples of using synodal techniques that people could observe e.g. Christian Life Community meetings, the Friday 11-12am group studying the following Sunday Readings at St Peter’s. There will also be opportunities in your own meetings.

“among the requirements for a good discernment process, a clear definition of its objectives is essential, ensuring that they are realistic and proportionate to the time available, the spaces that can be used, and the number of participants involved... it is crucial that each participant arrives adequately prepared and that the context foster a climate of prayer and an inner openness to listening and dialogue... avoiding abrupt disruptions and allowing participants to focus more decisively on the issues under discernment.” 4.1: Pathways for the Implementation Phase of the Synod – i.e. good planning is so important.

Trust is at the heart of synodality; developing this only happens when there are opportunities for us all to listen to each other and have dialogue. Trust is won through positive experiences.
